### INTRODUCTION

On July, 1, 2022, the Connecticut General Assembly passed legislation requiring Regional Educational Service Centers (RESC) to develop a statewide training program to support public school educators address trauma.

Trauma can negatively impact physical, mental, emotional, and behavioral development, and can have lasting effects on health, well-being, and prosperity well into adulthood. A trauma-informed approach can help schools thoughtfully look at strategies to identify areas that may be perpetuating trauma responses in students, staff, and families. Nationally, 63% of children have faced some form of adverse childhood experience (ACE) and 20-25% of youth from low-income backgrounds experience 4 or more ACEs. In Connecticut, it was reported that 49% of youth aged 12-17 had depression but did not receive any care in 2020 and of the 51% that did receive care, 70% were receiving that support at school. Children affected by trauma are far more likely to experience learning difficulties, mental health concerns, lower grades and graduation rates, increased suspensions and expulsions, increased involvement with child welfare and juvenile justice systems, long-term health problems and decreased life expectancy.

#### **Our Vision**

One day, schools across the state will infuse a trauma-informed lens into existing practices, realizing that this shift is critical for the well-being of their students, and will positively impact the climate for everyone in the building.

#### **About UPLIFT**

UPLIFT is a train-the-trainer program that is trauma-informed, resilience-focused, and individualized to meet the unique systemic needs of a school or district. The Regional Trauma Coordinators appointed by the RESCs provides training, technical assistance, and consultation to public school districts at **NO COST**.

#### The training program consists of nine modules, including:


- Foundations of Trauma-Informed Care (TIC)
- Compassionate Leadership
- Staff and System Wellness
- Trauma-Informed Care in Practice (6 Part) Series

UPLIFT is intended to be engaging, informative and application driven, with a focus on establishing foundational knowledge. The experience and program can be tailored for schools/districts, based on a needs assessment process. The Trauma-Informed Care in Practice is a series of modules based on the 6 guiding principles of trauma-informed care established by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

We have forged partnerships with 20 public school districts in our work to date. ### **OUTCOMES**



The starting point for many of our partners is to build a common language and knowledge base of the etiology, prevalence and impact of trauma on students, caregivers and staff, as well as practices and strategies that mitigate the effects of trauma exposure. **The following information is a summary of outcomes in FY24 Q1& Q2.** 

## 1780+ Participants

**1181 participants** for Foundations of Trauma-Informed Care, **232 participants** for district specific trainings and **113 participants** for Intro to UPLIFT

## 9 out of 10 Trainees

reported that training concepts were relevant to their work & could be immediately applied in practice

## 54 Presentations& Trainings



## **MEASURING PROGRESS**

The Regional Trauma Coordinators have developed several tools to monitor and measure the implementation of trauma-informed care practices for CT schools. **See table below for a list of tools:** 

**TOOLS PURPOSE** A guide that outlines UPLIFT's **UPLIFT Curriculum** modules and objectives. A checklist used to evaluate how the six core principles of **Trauma-Informed Care** TIC are being put into action **Walkthrough Checklist** throughout various school settings. A rating scale used to measure **Trauma-Informed Care** beliefs and practices of school-based staff regarding **Beliefs of Educators (TIC-BE)** trauma-informed care. A guide for trainees to deliver **UPLIFT** modules or offer **UPLIFT Train-the-Trainer Manual** trauma-informed consultation to school staff.
